NURSERY EXPANSION

SAPO extended their nursery activities to Greyton from 1 March 2017. A co-operation agreement was signed with Mr Kootjie Viljoen of Oewerzicht.



SAVING WATER

A new complex water filtering system, designed by specialists, was installed to change the cooling water used for the nucleus tunnels from municipality water to water in the storage system of our fountain water.

Big Bucks, an apple mutation from the popular Corder Gala varietal, was discovered in 2011 in the Elgin Valley by Buks Nel. In 2015 there was an estimated 120 000 buds on order for Big Bucks. That number has since increased to a whopping 600 000 buds! SAPO Trust is responsible for cutting the bud wood and takes pride in only cutting the best, true-to-type material.



VISIT FROM THE UK
